



The following document is part of a Dulwich Society project to digitise, transcribe and translate the Dulwich Manorial Court Rolls. They begin in 1333 and continue, with some breaks, to 1908.

In this case, the document is evidence of the existence of a lost Roll, rather than a Roll itself.

Text in **red**, apart from modern notes by the transcriber, indicates text missing from, or entirely illegible in, the original document.

Text in various shades of **grey** indicates text which, in the original document, is to a greater or lesser extent difficult to decipher.

Otherwise, all contemporaneous text is in **black**, except for presumed later additions which are indicated in **brown** or **blue**.

Roll

N.B. This Roll is not extant, and what follow are copies of extracts from the roll made for the copyholder concerned as his or her title deed. Both extracts are from the roll for the Wednesday after All Saints' Day in the 4th regnal year of King Richard II, which began on 22nd June 1380. All Saints' Day in that year fell on a Thursday, giving the date on which the Court was held as Wednesday, 7th November 1380.

The first extract is Muniment 201 in Warner's Catalogue :

At the Court held at Dilwysch on Wednesday next after the feast of All Saints in the fourth regnal Year of king Richard, the second after the conquest of England, William Brand [comes] & surrendered into the lord's hands a messuage & 11 acres of land with appurtenances in Dilwysch to the benefit of Cristina Mortlake & of Walter son of John Mortlake d-----

The second and third extracts are combined as Muniment 202 in Warner's Catalogue :

At the Court held there on Wednesday next after the feast of All Saints in the fourth regnal Year of king Richard, the second after the conquest of England, the Jurors present that John Mortlake has closed his last day and [was] tenant of two acres of land called Garscoyneslonde which he had of the house of Bermondeseye Therefore the bailiff is ordered to answer to the lord for the profits

Likewise at this Court they say that William Brand surrendered into the lord's hands a messuage & 11 acres of land with appurtenances in Dylwissh to the benefit of Cristina Mortlake & of Walter son of John Mortlake -----
