



The following document is part of a Dulwich Society project to digitise, transcribe and translate the Dulwich Manorial Court Rolls. They begin in 1333 and continue, with some breaks, to 1908.

In this case, the document is evidence of the existence of a lost Roll, rather than a Roll itself.

Text in **red**, apart from modern notes by the transcriber, indicates text missing from, or entirely illegible in, the original document.

Text in various shades of **grey** indicates text which, in the original document, is to a greater or lesser extent difficult to decipher.

Otherwise, all contemporaneous text is in **black**, except for presumed later additions which are indicated in **brown** or **blue**.

Roll

N.B. This Roll is not extant, and what follows is a transcription of an extract from the roll made in each case for the copyholder concerned as his or her title deed.

This is Muniment 227 in Warner's Catalogue :

Dyllewyssh ¶ At the Court there held on the Thursday next after the feast of Saint Denis the prophet, in the first regnal year of king Henry, the sixth after the conquest, Came Robert Wade & surrendered into the lord's hands one tenement called Brounynges & four acres of land belonging to the same tenement, with its appurtenances, Whereby befalls to the lord, for a heriot, as much as he gives for rent, by the custom of this Manor, because he had no animals, To the benefit of John Elys & his wife Joan. And they have seisin, by the rod, in open Court, To have & to hold to themselves and their [heirs] at the will of the lord, according to the custom of this Manor, Rendering & making the rent & services therefor hitherto owed & accustomed. And they gave the lord, for a fine for having entry, 40d. And they were admitted. And they made fealty to the lord.

*[Copyhold deed. Dated Thursday after the feast of Saint Denis 'the prophet' (presumably St. Denis of Paris, not St Denis the Areopagite) [October 9], 1 Hen VI, i.e. 15 October 1422.]*
