



The following document is part of a Dulwich Society project to digitise, transcribe and translate the Dulwich Manorial Court Rolls. They begin in 1333 and continue, with some breaks, to 1908.

In this case, the document is evidence of the existence of a lost Roll, rather than a Roll itself.

Text in **red**, apart from modern notes by the transcriber, indicates text missing from, or entirely illegible in, the original document.

Text in various shades of **grey** indicates text which, in the original document, is to a greater or lesser extent difficult to decipher.

Otherwise, all contemporaneous text is in **black**, except for presumed later additions which are indicated in **brown** or **blue**.

N.B. This Roll is not extant, and what follows are copies of extracts from the roll made in each case for the copyholder concerned as his title deed.

The following extract is Muniment 259 in Warner's Catalogue, not yet transcribed :

Dyllewyssh. At the Court there held on Wednesday next after the feast of saint Barnabas the Apostle in the 21<sup>st</sup> regnal Year of king Henry VI<sup>th</sup> it is testified by the sworn tenants, namely Walter Knyght, Elias Ingolf, Thomas Lane & others, that Juliana Fayrher, by her attorney John Brutone, farmer, surrendered into the lord's hands one messuage & 30 acres of land by estimation, with its appurtenances, lately William Haukyn's and afterwards Robert Cloptone's (citizen & baker of London), whereby falls to the lord as a heriot as much as she gave the lord as rent because she had no animals, to the use of John Bakere, to whom seisin thereof is conceded by the rod in open Court, to Have & to Hold to himself & his [heirs] at the will of the lord, according to the custom of the manor, by the rent & services thereof hitherto owed & accustomed. And he gave 6s 8d as a fine for having entry. And he made fealty to the lord, & he was admitted.

The following extract is Muniment 260 in Warner's Catalogue, not yet transcribed :

Dyllewyssh. To the [same] Court there held on Wednesday next after the feast of saint Barnabas the Apostle in the 21<sup>st</sup> regnal Year of king Henry VI<sup>th</sup> came the said John Bakere & surrendered into the lord's hands the said messuage & 30 acres of land with appurtenances, whereby falls to the lord as a heriot as much as he gave the lord as rent because he had no animals. And in the same Court the lord re-conceded to the aforesaid John Bakere & to William Knyght, Citizen & butcher of London, the said messuage & lands with appurtenances, of which seisin thereof is conceded by the rod in open Court, to Have & to hold hold to themselves & their [heirs] at the will of the lord, according to the custom of the manor, by the rent & services thereof hitherto owed & accustomed. And they gave 6s 8d as a fine for having entry. And they made fealty to the lord. And they were admitted.
