



The following document is part of a Dulwich Society project to digitise, transcribe and translate the Dulwich Manorial Court Rolls. They begin in 1333 and continue, with some breaks, to 1908.

In this case, the document is evidence of the existence of a lost Roll, rather than a Roll itself.

Text in **red**, apart from modern notes by the transcriber, indicates text missing from, or entirely illegible in, the original document.

Text in various shades of **grey** indicates text which, in the original document, is to a greater or lesser extent difficult to decipher.

Otherwise, all contemporaneous text is in **black**, except for presumed later additions which are indicated in **brown** or **blue**.

N.B. This Roll is not extant, and what follows is a copy of an extract from the roll made for the copyholder concerned as his title deed.

The extract is Muniment 207 in Warner's Catalogue :

Dilwhissh At the Court held there on Thursday next after the feast of saint Andrew the Apostle, in the sixth regnal Year of King Edward the fourth after the conquest, William Ode & his wife Joan took from the lord one half acre of land, with appurtenances, at Watryngstenend, to themselves & the heirs of the said William, by the rod, at the will of the lord, according to the custom of the manor, by rent of two pence a year & services therein properly owed & accustomed. And they gave the lord as a fine for having entry ---2s. And they made fealty to the lord, & they were admitted tenants.
