



The following document is part of a Dulwich Society project to digitise, transcribe and translate the Dulwich Manorial Court Rolls. They begin in 1333 and continue, with some breaks, to 1908.

In this case, the document is evidence of the existence of a lost Roll, rather than a Roll itself.

Text in **red**, apart from modern notes by the transcriber, indicates text missing from, or entirely illegible in, the original document.

Text in various shades of **grey** indicates text which, in the original document, is to a greater or lesser extent difficult to decipher.

Otherwise, all contemporaneous text is in **black**, except for presumed later additions which are indicated in **brown** or **blue**.

N.B. This Roll is not extant. The following is from Roll F1 [previously E1] (back), ll. 19-28, for 15 Dec 1519, which refers to a transaction of this earlier date :

At This Court it is testified by the Steward that a certain surrender was made to him, outside the Court, by Henry Knyghte & Thomas Knyghte, of two acres of land lying at the Nappes, which was[sic] lately Ellis Godsones, & one Field of land alled Frenchefelde, & two acres of wood lying in the Napse, sometime Walter Knyghtes, as appears in the Roll of the Court bearing date in the 22<sup>nd</sup> year of Henry VII [i.e. 22/8/1506 – 21/8/1507], to the benefit of Henry Knyghte, which said Henry is present in Court, & seeks to be admitted to the aforesaid two acres of land, & the Field aforesaid, & the aforesaid two acres of wood, To whom the lord, by his Steward there, conceded seisin thereof to him, to have & to hold the aforesaid two acres of land, & the Field aforesaid, & the aforesaid two acres of wood, to himself, [his] heirs & assigns, at the will of the lord, according to the Custom of the manor, by the rent & services thereof owed & by Law accustomed, & he made fealty to the lord, & Thus he was admitted tenant, & he gave the lord for a fine for having such entry [---blank]

[After the opening 'At this Cou..', the whole of this paragraph in Roll F1 [previously E1] (back) has evidently been erased and then over-written in black ink. Although illegible, traces of the original text may still be seen.]
