



The following document is part of a Dulwich Society project to digitise, transcribe and translate the Dulwich Manorial Court Rolls. They begin in 1333 and continue, with some breaks, to 1903.

In this case, the document is evidence of the existence of a lost Roll, rather than a Roll itself.

Text in **red**, apart from modern notes by the transcriber, indicates text missing from, or entirely illegible in, the original document.

Text in various shades of **grey** indicates text which, in the original document, is to a greater or lesser extent difficult to decipher.

Otherwise, all contemporaneous text is in **black**, except for presumed later additions which are indicated in **brown** or **blue**.

The Jurors for the Lord King say upon their oath that John Hartway & [blank] Cooper, gent., two of the tenants and residents of this Manor, owe suit of this Court, and at this day make default, therefore each of them is amerced at five shillings, payable to the lord of the aforesaid Manor. Penalties

At this Court it is ordered

~~Also, they present~~ that Thomas Cranwell shall scour his ditch over the Common ~~to which~~ containing sixty rods, in English 'rods', before the feast of saint Michael next ensuing, under penalty of forfeiting to the Lords six pence for each rod not scoured before the same time.

Also, it is ordered that Nicholas Badger shall scour his ditch over the Common, containing fifteen rods, before ~~the feast of~~

~~saint Micha~~ the aforesaid time, under the like penalty.

Also, it is ordered that Richard Perry shall scour his ditch over the Common ~~before the same~~ containing fifty rods before the same time, under the like penalty.

Also, it is ordered that Thomas Bletchenden, gent., shall make a sufficient palisade to the Pond ^{or fill in the pond} ~~xxxxx~~ ^{next to} his house, being a danger to the inhabitants, before the tenth day of June next, under penalty of forfeiting to the Lords 10 pounds.

Also, it is ordered that **[blank]** Mousley, gentlewoman, shall open up her ditch against the high-way, before the 24th day of June next ^{of forfeiting to the Lords} ensuing, under penalty ten shillings if it is not opened up before the same time.

Also, it is ordered that Thomas Butterfeild shall scour his ditch in front of his barn, containing five rods, before the 24th day of June next, under penalty of forfeiting One shilling for each and every rod undone before the same time.
